Keeping the Story Alive by Katie Kerwei

As with most new settlements in Austria-Hungary, the premier event after the founding of the village was the completion and dedication of the church. Following three years of construction which began in 1820, Liebling's Lutheran Church was dedicated on October 19, 1823, amid great celebration. The church was the largest Lutheran church located in a Banater village, and it was erected in the largest Protestant village of Banat. Upon its dedication it was agreed that Liebling's Kirchweihfest (the festival for the founding of the church) would be held annually on the Sunday following the Theresia name-sake day, which was October 15. Kirchweih in Liebling also corresponded with the end of the corn harvest and the growing season, another cause for celebration. As work in the fields slowly came to an end, the first order of preparation for Kerwei was painting the home exteriors and whitewashing the tree trunks along the streets. The still warm, dry

days of October were the perfect time for this annual task. The work of preparing the Tracht (traditional dress) for the Kirchweihfest was labor intensive. Each teenaged girl and young woman wore four distinct Trachten to the three dances and the church service during Kerwei. On display was not only the Tracht's fine workmanship of each handcrafted piece, but also the family's financial investment into the luxurious fabrics. Every detail and every pleat was given full attention and was worn with great pride. The wearer also carried a sprig of rosemary. Around noon on Saturday of Kerwei, work stopped in the fields perhaps until the following Tuesday. The workers hurried home to care for their animals, clean up yards and houses, and to finalize preparations for the day ahead. That evening a regular meal was shared, then the young people dressed for the first night of dancing wearing their regular dance attire known as, "Sonntags Tanz Tracht". On the Sunday morning of the Kirchweih, almost every soul in Liebling attended the ten o'clock church service wearing the traditional "Sonntags Tracht", the dark formal church attire. Following the service, families returned home for the four course Sunday meal of beef soup, beef with horseradish sauce, pork roast with potatoes and vegetables or roast duck with plums, and fancy torte. After the mid-day meal, the girls and young women dressed in their finest "Kerwei Tanz Tracht", the Kirchweih dance Tracht, for the afternoon dances. Girls wore pleated satin overskirts in red, pink, white, green, or turquoise blue over 3-4 pleated and starched petticoats. Included were a fine white blouse with tall pleated and starched sleeves, an embroidered dark vest in velvet or satin, a delicate satin shawl with silk fringe, a blue satin apron with black lace, and thin light-colored knee socks. This outfit best resembles the Tracht worn at today's Kerwei, however, today cashmere shawls are often worn in place of satin shawls. Men wore black suits with a white shirt and no hats to dances. By quarter to one on Sunday afternoon, the streets were filled with well-dressed teenaged girls, boys, and young married couples who walked to their dance halls while families watched

from their homes and benches. In the tavern the music commenced promptly at one o'clock with the playing of the beloved Strauss waltz, "An der schönen blauen Donau", The Blue Danube. Dancing then continued until late afternoon. When the music ended, the girls and young married couples walked home for a quick meal and to change their Tracht. Meanwhile an age-group of boys would hire the band to play at a boy's home while they had dinner and waited for their girls to join them. When the girls arrived they wore white aprons with their Tracht, in celebration of the extra party. All the youth of Liebling reassembled at their taverns in the evening for the final night of dancing, which continued into the early hours of Monday morning. On this last night of Kerwei the girls wore the "Kerwei Owed Tanz Tracht", the Kirchweih evening dance attire, which included flowered cashmere pleated overskirts all in the same color, and a blue, green, or brown flowered cashmere shawl. Many of today's familiar traditions of Kirchweihfest were not found in Liebling before the second World War. After consulting multiple reliable Lieblinger sources, there were no references to a Kirchweih Strauss with ribbons, an auction, a march, nor boy's decorated hats. My primary source confirmed that, and stated that upon arriving in Chicago in 1950, these elements were at the Lieblinger Verein's Kirchweih, perhaps being adopted from other Banater Donauschwaben. In time, a rosemary Strauss decorated with ribbons, its auction, and an Aufmarch with girls in Tracht and boys with decorated hats became part of the Lieblinger Kerwei not only in Chicago, but in Canada, in Germany, and even in Liebling.
